RETURNING OFFICER HEADQUARTERS

For the District 11 Charlottetown - Parkdale By-Election, voting was offered at the Office of the Returning Officer during office hours, beginning on November 15 - 17, 2017 and again November 21-23, 2017. This allowed for increased voting opportunities for those who could not attend the polling locations on either advance polling days or Election Day.

REGISTER OF ELECTORS

Pursuant to Section 24.1(2) of the *Election Act*, it was determined a confirmation of electors was not required for the By-Election as the Register of Electors was being maintained and current due to increased registration from the 2016 Plebiscite on Democratic Renewal as well as consistent updates received from the Department of Transportation, Infrastructure and Energy - Highway Safety Division.

ONLINE REGISTRATION

Elections PEI's Online Registration Portal was implemented once again for the event which allowed electors to enter their information online to see if they were registered on the Register of Electors. Voters could verify whether the information was correct, or submit updates.

IDENTIFICATION AT THE POLLS

To improve the integrity of the voting process, the requirement for identification at the polls was put in place which required electors to show either one piece of identification with their name and current address, or to show two pieces which satisfied both criteria. A list of acceptable identification was on the Voter Information Cards, the online registration portal and at the polls for reference.

PROCESS AT THE POLL

The By-Election saw the implementation of a new in-person voting model which was designed to streamline the time it took the voter to enter the polling location, cast their ballot and leave. This was achieved by the use of technology for an electronic voters list, onsite registration and re-issuing replacement Voter Information Cards. The separation of Poll Clerk and the ballot management by the Deputy Returning Officer improved voter movement within the poll. There was little to no waiting at the polls to vote. Voters provided positive feedback and this process will be reviewed for future consideration.

ADVANCE POLL DAYS

During the 3 day advance polls, 835 voters (23.09%) cast their ballot, while an additional 367 (10.15%) voters took advantage of advance special voting opportunities such as mail-in ballot, voting at the Returning Office or a mobile poll. Voting at the Returning Office was met with positive feedback, citing accessibility and ease of voting as positive voting experiences.


ORDINARY POLLING DAY

Election Day polls were combined into one central polling location which allowed for the reduction in election personnel required as well as a streamlined approach to moving electors through the polling station. Electors could visit any of the polling officials and be recorded electronically as having voted and then were directed to the Deputy Returning Officer to be issued a ballot. This process enhances the voting experience by maintaining a constant flow of traffic and minimal waiting times.

REPORTING OF RESULTS

After the close of the polls, the advance poll results were reported immediately. Ordinary poll results were posted online as they were being reported to Elections PEI. The counting and reporting of Ordinary Poll results was slower than anticipated, however Elections PEI's priority is accurate reporting of results, and election officials are instructed to double check the counts before providing results numbers for public release.

The counting process is currently being reviewed for areas of enhancement.


